SCENE II—The Council Chamber in the Palace.
SCENE III—A Room in the Palace, the same night.
SCENE IV—A Pavilion in the Garden of the Royal Palace at Eltham, Autumn, 1386.
SCENE V—A Room in the Tower of London, a month later.

INTERVAL OF TEN MINUTES

Part II

- SCENE I—A Room in the Royal Palace at Sheen, three years later.
SCENE II—The same, two years later.
SCENE III—A Street in London.
SCENE IV—A Gallery overlooking the Great Hall at Westminster, three years later.
SCENE V—A Room in the lodgings of the Earl of Derby, in Paris, three years later.
SCENE VI—Courtyard of Conway Castle, six months later.
SCENE VII—A Room in the Tower of London, a month later.

HISTORICAL NOTE.

The Black Prince, son of Edward III, who died before his father, had a son Richard, born at Bordeaux. In 1377, at the age of ten, he became Richard II of England, and is eighteen when the play opens. His uncles, the Duke of Lancaster (*John of Gaunt*), York and Gloucester, are opposed to his reign and his foreign policy, and are trying to control him in Parliament.

Lancaster has a son, the Earl of Derby, who is about to become Henry IV at the end of the play. Robert de Vere, Earl of Oxford, died in exile in 1399. Thomas Mowbray, Earl of Nottingham, died in exile in 1399. Richard died in the same year, whether by foul play or from natural causes is not known.
