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MR WOOLF BACK AS GOVERNOR

The return to the school by an ex-Biology teacher as a governor has prompted great concern amongst the staff.

Mr. Harvey Woolf resigned from his position last January using a skull-and-crossbones to end his letter of notice, which gave no reason for his leaving.

"Wilt On High" by Tom Sharpe.

This is the third Wilt book; the first two are "WILT" and "THE WILT ALTERNATIVE". Henry Wilt teaches at his local Polytechnic, but also has two other jobs on the side - he needs these to support his four daughters' expensive needs! Wilt becomes a victim of events both at home and at work.

Dead schoolgirls, laced beer, some US Airmen, a gas attack, a third-degree interrogation and a mayor's wife all play important roles in the rest of the story.

As in all of Tom Sharpe's brilliant books, the "hero" becomes a victim of circumstances beyond his control and this results in an hilarious novel! Published by Pan Books at just £2.50, I recommend that anyone with a sense of humour reads this book as soon as possible!

SOFTWARE REVIEW - "SPEECH!"

SUPERIOR SOFTWARE - VARIOUS COMPUTERS

"SPEECH!" is the latest thoroughbred from the Superior stable, better known for such BBC and Electron gems as "CITADEL" and "REPTON". It is simplicity itself to use - just type *SAY followed by the text you would like spoken. Then press <RETURN> and your computer speaks!

It does this by converting your text into 49 phonemes (!), or sounds, and producing them.

The pitch of the speech can be altered with the *PITCH command followed by a letter A to Z. (A indicates the highest pitch, Z the lowest.)

You can use the individual phonemes directly with the *SPEAK command. A number after a vowel sound alters its pitch - 1 being the lowest, 9 being the highest.

You can switch the screen display off with the *OFF command, which improves the quality of the speech. *LIGHT returns the screen display to normal.

"SPEECH!" is a very well packaged program, and it comes with three other programs for use with "SPEECH!"

DEMO - which shows off the features of "SPEECH!"

SPELL - a spelling test where the program says a word and you spell it

SAVFILE - this program says your word-processor files out loud for you.

All in all "SPEECH!" is a very good speech synthesiser at a reasonable price.

TECHNOLOGY AND 'THE ISSUE'

"THE ISSUE" is created on the BBC Computer with the aid of the AMX Mouse and the "PAGEMAKER" software package. All the material is collected and then each page is designed on the "PAGEMAKER".

Each page is printed at near-letter quality on A4 sized paper, then lithographed on the school machine and then, finally, hopefully, you buy the finished article!

The mouse itself is a gadget with three buttons which moves a cursor around the computer screen, with which you can create all sorts of fonts, graphics and the like!

'THE ISSUE' TALKS TO MR THOMPSON

Did you know that one of the teachers in school was once an international Rugby League star? Well, it's true!

The Economics/Social Studies head, Mr. T.C. Thompson, whose age is unknown, was once a top professional.

In an interview with us he said that he played top flight Rugby League for ten years, "I played for Hunslet from 1959 to 1963, and then for Workington until 1969 when a bad knee injury ended my career."

During these years, Mr. Thompson played for Yorkshire twice, England twice, Great Britain twice, and the British Empire twice.

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
