The other winner was Aaron Evans, a student on the college's Kickstart programme. Kickstart is designed to help students with English and Maths GCSEs and employability skills, and tutor, Alison Stenton, highlighted Aaron as a standout student:

"Aaron has been with the college for the past 18 months and had some health issues which impeded his progress last year, but this year he has been doing so well. He achieved a Grade 5 in maths in his November exam 2020 and is now on course for a Grade 8. He is also on course for a Grade 7/8 in English – this is an incredible improvement.

Aaron has also been our Citizen of the Month in Kickstart and always works hard. He wants to be an astro-physicist in the future and we feel he has the talent to achieve this goal."

Aaron is planning to start an Access to HE course with the college in September, as he starts his journey towards university-level study.
